Meier & Co, and was launched on 9 May 1842. 200 Commerzlasten / 521 tons register, 35,4 x 9,0 x 5,6 meters (length x beam x depth of hold). 20 June 1842, maiden voyage from Bremerhaven to New York, Jürgen Meyer, master, with 10 cabin passengers and 206 in steerage. Meyer was succeeded as master of the META in 1846 by Christoph de Harde, of Bremerhaven.

In 1857, the META was sold to Gerhard IhlderJr. and Hilderich Ihlder, both of Bremen, who placed her under the command of, in turn, Johann Jaburg, of Vegesack, and Georg August Theodor Hartmann, of Bremerhaven. In 1862, the META was sold to Norwegian interests in Arendal. Her last owner was H. Aalholm, of Arendal, her last master G. M. Halvorsen. She was scrapped in 1896.

Louis was an engineer on the barge Marcia owned by the Pittsburgh Steamship company out of Cleveland, Ohio. George Washington Balfour was the Captain. The Marcia went down in Lake Superior, 8 miles from Two Harbors, Minnesota during an ice storm, two days before Thanksgiving in 1905. The Marcia was thrown into the rocks and shortly after the steamship Lafavette crashed sideways into the rocks breaking into three pieces. The steamship landed with the barge in the middle. Only one man was lost in the accident the rest scrambling on to the barge to get off. The men wandered in the forest for two days before returning right back to the site of the accident. Finding it safe to board they cooked Thanksgiving dinner. When they were in the forest they had a problem starting a fire and Captain George Washington Balfour had some letters from his wife in the pocket of his horsehide coat. These were what they used to get a fire started. It also was told that Louis was the first man off the barge after the accident because he was the smallest.

The following is from Clare Gilbert, Sylvan Scale Models in response to a quire on the internet: The accident you refer to happened sometime after 1AM November 28, 1905. According to Dr. Wolff's book the early morning of the 28th was a particularly bad one for the Pittsburgh company. Within a 90 minute period no fewer than 5 of the

company's ships were involved in accidents in the west end of Lake Superior. It began when the Crescent City ran aground off Duluth after fighting a losing battle with the weather for three hours, being dragged for 20 miles from Two Harbors almost to Duluth with her anchors down and engines running full speed against the wind. Shortly after the William Edenborn and her barge the Madeira parted the tow lines a both ran aground. At the same time the 454 foot steamer Lafayette, bound for West Superior, towing the 436 foot barge Manila were fighting a losing battle against nature, Driven off course Captain Dell P. Wright of the Lafayette had no idea where he was in the blinding snow. The Lafayette was sent broadside into large rocks about 50 feet offshore, opposite the north end of Encampment Island, six miles northeast of Two Harbors. The spot has since been named Lafayett Bluff. With no time to drop anchors the barge went on hard, ramming the stern of the Lafayette, permitting four of the Lafayette's crew to jump onto the barge. The Lafayette broke in two in less than three minutes. The stern section swung around and remained 50 feet off shore, while the forward section was driven against the beach. Captain Balfour of the barge manila and his crew along with the four crewmen from the Lafayette were able to get ashore by climbing trees that were hanging over the waters edge. The steamer's second engineer grabbed a large nut from the engine room and tied it to a rope which he was able to throw ashore. Captain Balfour retrieved the line from a tree and the barges crew was able to pull a heavier hawser to shore. The crew on the Lafavette's stern were able to climb hand over hand to safety, except for Fireman Patrick Wade who slopped off the line and perished. The crew on the forward section were able to jump to the rocks and get off the boat. They built fires in the forest and tried to find protection from the wind. When the seas subsided the following day they were able to re board the Manila where they had heat and food. The had been able to find a local fisherman who hiked the six miles to Two Harbors to notify the Company of the accident. The survivors were removed on the 29th. Many of them had to be hospitalized for frostbitten hands and feet. Just 150 feet of the Lafayette's stern was salvaged, some nine months later. The Manila was repaired and re floated without much difficulty.

The following is a reply from Vienna, Austria about an old gun that was said to have been his father's.

some time ago you sent me a mail concerning Mathias Nowotny the maker of a gun you have. In the meantime I have got some information. M. N. was born in Leitmertz (Litomerice) in bohemia (now in Cechia). He came to Vienna in 1838. In 1852 he leased his gun shop to Johann springer and got 1853 a licence for a gun production (small factory). He was supplier to the court of the Austrian emperor. He shot himself in 1856. His widow then sells the whole business to Johann Springer who himself marries M.N.'s sister. A Johann Springer gun shop still exists here in Vienna.

I hope this is of some help to you. Regards,

After her husband passed away, she remained on their Farm on Rattle run road until she 'slowed down" and lived with relatives nearby, where she passed away. she was a slightly built person, yet she outlived her seven brothers and a sister. She faithfully attended Sunday Mass in St. Mary's Catholic church, and she passed away before the week was up after attending her last Service.

Her neighbors and friends felt some tribute should be given to Theresa, for she represents the passing of an era. They were amazed at her strength--she made about everything she needed, kept a spotless home, and sewed all her clothes on the first sewing machine she ever owned. She was proud to relate it was brought by steamboat from Cincinnati along with a buffet.

She still used an ironing board propped between a table and chair, living beautifully in present pioneer fashion. Her wooden floors were so well scrubbed they were white with a hand-rubbed high gloss, which as yet no scientist has been able to discover and produce to put in a bottle and get the same results. Only because her formula was pure and simple--soap she made, a cloth, and elbow power for a shine and natural color you would never believe!

I know, for I saw that floor when I was doing the article on her prize shovel when she won the award for the oldest one in St. Clair. Even then, Dodie Brady had to coax Theresa for quite some time to enter the shovel contest, for she was gracious and friendly and practiced humility, which came naturally.

Mass of Christian burial was offered Aug. 14 in St. Mary's, with Father Jerome Swierzb as the celebrant and burial
