

MEDICAL HERITAGE

A family medical history can be lifesaving. It gives you the ability to provide any health-care provider with essential information that is often necessary when diagnosing and treating family members. With the complex environment of health care, keeping track of family medical records can be a challenge.

Family history and genealogy are natural links to creating a medical pedigree. Examples of records that family historians use to build medical pedigrees include:

DEATH CERTIFICATES: A death certificate is created at the time of someone's death. This record usually includes the primary and secondary causes of death, date of onset of the illness, and surgeries that were performed as part of treatment. An attending physician usually completes it. What your family remembers as the cause of death and what is on the death certificate can be very different. Death certificates are kept in the state where the deceased passed away, not where they were buried.

MORTALITY SCHEDULES. The federal government between the years of 1850 and 1885 kept mortality schedules. They list deaths of the twelve months prior to the census. For example, the schedule of 1860 records deaths from June 1, 1959 through May 31, 1860.

These schedules give a state-by-state register of deaths. They predate the registration of vital statistics at the turn of the century. The deaths that are recorded represent only about 13 percent of all deaths, but is still an important source in lieu of vital statistics. The schedules include the name, age, sex, color, and marital status, free or slave status, place of birth, occupation, disease or cause of death, and number of days of illness. These schedules can be found in state archives, the DAR Library, the National Archives, and the Family History Library in Salt Lake and its Family History Centers.


INSURANCE RECORDS. Life insurance, in particular, can be a great source of information. As early as 1865, medical information was included on life insurance applications. Information about the general health, lifestyle, and condition of your ancestor could be found there. Each insurance company is different. Deal with corporate headquarters and tell them you are interested in information to complete a medical file on your family. "The Source: A Guidebook of American Genealogy" has a list of insurance companies from the 1800s forward.

CEMETERY AND FUNERAL RECORDS. Cemetery records often contain information about the cause of death. Check with the sexton's office in the cemetery where your ancestor was buried. Some tombstones identify the cause of death or illness. Churches often keep funeral records, and mortuary records can also be valuable.

<u>OBITUARIES</u>. Older newspaper accounts usually identify the disease or illness that contributed to the cause of death. An important clue in modern obituaries is often the charity that the family requests donations for.

Blood relationship determines the shared gene percentage between family members. The closer the blood relationship, the greater percentage of common genes.

Understanding how genetic traits are shared by blood relationship underscores the importance of gathering information on horizontal (brothers and sisters, aunts, uncles, and cousins) as well as vertical (mother and father, grandparents, and great-grandparents) ancestors. Four generations of medical information is usually enough to be helpful for your medical diagnostic purposes.

A medical pedigree chart is the final graphic product of a medical genetic history. This format shows family relationships, the easiest place to start. Share your information with family members and have them fill in the information they know. Try to get a copy of each death certificate to verify the information. It is also important to also document miscarriages and stillbirths.

After establishing family relationships, identify the health status of as many individuals as possible. Document as many events as possible: death, birth dates, dates of hospitalization, or beginning of a medical condition.

The following genetic diseases are more prevalent among different ethnic groups: Tay-Sachs disease (European Jewish), Malignant hypothermia (French-Canadian, European, Italian, Norwegian, and Welsh), Thasselemia (Mediterranean, Southeast Asian, Middle Eastern, or African), sickle cell anemia (African-Americans), and cystic fibrosis (European and some African-American families), congenital nephrosis (Scandinavian).

A professional review of the research you complete will help identify what additional information may be needed and may indicate what, if any, medical treatment you should seek. Genetic counselors can help you understand your family medical history.

Be sensitive to family members who are unwilling to be involved or discuss medical history. Help them recognize the information they provide can be lifesaving to you or to future generations of your family. It is important to be concerned with the issue of privacy. The information you compile should be shared only with your health-care provider and blood relatives. Reach agreement with your extended family that your research will remain confidential and be treated with discretion. Discrimination can occur in the workplace and with health and life insurance if information about genetic conditions is treated casually.

SAMPLE QUESTIONS:

- 1. What was the date of death?
- 2. Cause of death, age of onset of the cause of death. Seek documentation.
- 3. Other known illnesses or surgeries during you ancestor's lifetime?
- 4. Did he or she smoke? How much and for how many years?
- 5. Drink or use drugs?
- 6. Miscarriages or stillbirths?



Author: Unknown




I read of a man who stood to speak

MICHIGAN LIGHTHOUSE PROGRAMS

Willard Library is pleased to present two multi-media programs on Michigan nature and history on Wednesday, October 20, 1999 with Ann and John Mahan, noted Michigan authors. These programs will be held in the Miller-Stone Building, across the street from the library. John and Ann Mahan specialize in photography and writing that focuses on the beauty and uniqueness of our own Great Lakes region. Subjects they have researched and share in their presentations include lighthouses, islands, shipwrecks, freighters, wildlife and ecology.

At noon on Wednesday, October 20th, the program will be "Great Lakes' Lighthouses." It features photographs of numerous lighthouses and other Great Lakes subjects. Inseparable from this watery wilderness are its dunes, Northwoods, wetlands, and islands—and its geologic, human and maritime history. With photographs, sound effects, narration, and music, this show explores Lake Michigan's wild and natural areas.
