When I do get to watch, my taste tends to run towards Red Wings hockey and the Discovery Channel, But from what I understand (i.e.-what my wife tells me), many of the most popular TV shows in America recently have been adaptations of popular shows in England.

From "Whose Line is it Anyway?" to "Dancing with the Stars," television shows that started off as UK programming have crossed the Atlantic to become staples of our prime-time lineups. Indeed, the English appear to have created the entire reality-TV genre, which Americans have since "perfected." However, as entertaining as these shows may be, there is one smash UK program

that I really hope to see adapted to American TV.

The name of this show is "Who Do You Think You Are?" and it is a documentary series that has been running since 2004 on the BBC network. In each episode, a popular actor or public figure travels back (figuratively and historically) to the ancestral homelands to trace his or her family tree. Aided by historians and genealogists, the tale of a specific ancestral family is told, often with as much "dirt" and scandal as can be ascertained given the facts at hand.

Amazingly, "Who Do You Think You Are?" is one of the most popular television shows in England and has been commissioned through its sixth season. In addition, the show has started spawning localized versions in Canada and Australia beginning in

2007. The show has done much to promote genealogy, especially during its first season by providing beginner's tips in the last few minutes of each show.

If you are interested, there are snippets of the show available online through a variety of sources, including the BBC and YouTube websites. So check it out and keep your fingers crossed that we someday soon can tune into our own American version of "Who Do You Think You Are?".

In the meanwhile, I wish you luck on your own personal researches into the topic. Since January 22nd is our annual sharing meeting, I encourage you to bring your own stories in to share with your colleagues in the Calhoun County Genealogical Society.

Introducing Treasurer—Art Adams

Our new treasurer is a lifelong resident of Calhoun County. Born at Marshall's "old" Oaklawn Hospital, Arthur Adams lives in Lee Township. Art, a retired millwright for Kellogg Company, was widowed only a year ago. His five stepchildren, all of whom live in the area, have given him an abundance of grandchildren and great

grandchildren to enjoy.

Art has been interested in family history since learning about his mother's family genealogy, dating to about 1630. William Henry Harrison Stowell wrote the genealogy, linking the family to a Norman knight, Adam De Stawell who arrived in England with William the Conqueror. His mother's family was from

England, but, like many of us, Art has a mixed genealogy, including Native American, Scottish and Irish. "I haven't had as much luck with my father's family-the Adams side," Art says. We hope the connections Art makes and the educational programs of the Calhoun County Genealogical Society will help Art break down his brick walls.




Do You Know Them?



She was born in 1909 in Marshall and died this past April just before her 98th birthday. She had graciously passed onto me all her family photos and documents and there were/are a LOT. Included was this picture of her Capital Hill School classmates which she had labeled with the initials you see above. BUT by the time I came around to view this with her, her memory of their names was gone.


Battle Creek—Manchester Street



Many of the doctors from the Battle Creek Sanitarium resided on or around Manchester Street in Battle Creek. From days gone by, these are pictures of the home of Dr. John Harvey Kellogg. The top picture was taken about 1914 and the bottom is dated 1902. According to family members the house had a gymnasium on the top floor. The property had a deer park and at some point a train that circled the grounds.

Dr. Kellogg and wife Ella fostered multiple children and adopted some say 14 of them including my great grandmother and one of her sisters. My grandfather, her son, is one of the two boys pictured at left. The house was filled with people.

The house no longer exists. It was torn down due to termites in late 1940s early 1950s. The property still shows some raised areas where the train circled the property.





Picture to left: I'm guessing this is a retake of a damaged picture of the Kellogg foster/adopted children just outside of their bedroom about 1902. Girl far right looks like Helena Sargent and girl standing behind her could be her sister Harriet.

Picture to right: Dr. Kellogg standing. I'm not sure of women. Wife Ella died in 1920 and Dr. Kellogg died in 1943. I'm guessing this picture was taken after 1920.
