YOUR GENEALOGICAL LEGACY
An Editorial

Many people feel that, since their genealogical research is "just a hobby," it somehow has less value than the "real work" they do. If the truth be known, genealogy is really more of an avocation (a calling or art) than a hobby (an amusement or diversion.) Perhaps the one thing that genealogists do not think about enough is the preservation of the data they have worked so hard to accumulate.

I think we need to realize that our hard-won research is as much a part of our personal legacy as anything else we might leave behind. It seems wise to protect it as carefully as anything else we value. After all, we really wouldn't want someone to have to search all over again for the very same data that we have labored so diligently to accumulate over the course of years.

Anyone who treasures his or her genealogical research should at least arrange to deposit acid free copies of everything in a bank safe deposit box or home fireproof safe. If you are working on a computer, duplicate data disks should also be made and kept elsewhere as off-site backups. If there is sufficient space

and interest, genealogical research can also be placed with a state or local genealogical or historical society, library or archives.

Whether it has been misplaced by heirs or destroyed in some long-forgotten catastrophe, there is perhaps nothing more discouraging than losing track of the work of an earlier family researcher. Imagine how hard it is to have to recoup your own losses after a fire, tornado or other act of nature.

There is another method of "tree preservation" that I find works very well. I protect my work by sharing my data with anyone who requests it. Sharing your family research is the friendliest, easiest and least expensive way of making sure that your work goes on even after you are gone...no matter what!

The Rev. Henry Felix Kloman departed this life on August 29th, 1942, Orange, New Jersey- "from strength to strength, in the life of perfect service--" (Last two in the same hand.)

DESCENDANTS SOUGHT

Robert T. "Bob" White of 13828 Beatties Ford Rd., Huntersville, NC 28078 wants to contact any local descendants of his great-great grandparents, Reverend and Mrs. George Morton and Hannah (SHANNAN) WHITE. The Whites came to Michigan in 1860 and were residents of Eaton and Calhoun counties for more than 30 years. Rev. WHITE was affiliated with the Methodist Episcopal Church and, for several years, preached for that denomination in Eaton: County, Michigan. He was also a carriage maker and a farmer.

Rev. George M. WHITE was born in Kempston, Bedfordshire, England on 6 December, 1811. He married Hannah SHANNAN 16

June, 1835. She died 18 November, 1889.

It is known that Torrance WHITE, one of the sons of George and Hannah WHITE, joined Co. H of the 13th Michigan from Carmel on 24 December, 1861. Additionally, the couple also had sons Joseph Biggs WHITE (born 19 July/Sept., 1846) of South Albion, John S. WHITE (born 5 March, 1838) of Peaster, Texas and a daughter, Martha Jane WHITE FINK (born 18 July, 1849) of Lake Odessa. All were listed as survivors in George's obituary after his death on 21 June, 1895 at Joseph B. WHITE's residence in South Albion. According to some family correspondence, it is also known that Joseph B. WHITE lived for a time in the Olivet area. Rev. George and Hannah (SHANNAN) WHITE are buried in a Cemetery near Olivet.


