Memberships are accepted year-round; dues received after May 1 will pay for the following year's membership. Members receive Generations newsletter six times per year. All are invited to submit articles to the Generations editor. Permission is granted to reprint articles unless otherwise noted. Please give appropriate credit to the source. Copies of pages from back issues of Generations are available for \$1.00 for the first page and \$.50 for each additional page. General meetings are held at 7 p.m. the fourth Tuesday of each month at the LDS Marshall Branch Church 16036 Old US -27, Marshall, unless otherwise specified. News from the Archives of Michigan from Senior Archivist, Kris Rzepczynski

The big news at the Archives is that the naturalization records digitization project is officially underway! Working together with FamilySearch, and with assistance from the Michigan Genealogical Council, the Archives of Michigan will ultimately be posting all of our Michigan naturalization records online for free at Seeking Michigan (www.seekingmichigan.org). No completion date has been given as this is a unique set of records to digitize and eventually index.

Beginning in January 2017, the next year of Michigan death records – 1941 – will become available online at Seeking Michigan (www.seekingmichigan.org). With the 75-year restriction for online access to death records, 1941 online certificates become available in 2017. The 1941 images will take a few weeks to be fully loaded online at Seeking Michigan, so please be patient with us and check back often; in the meantime, the index metadata (up through 1952) will continue to be available.

Save the dates! The 2017 Abrams Foundation Family History Seminar will be held Friday, July 21 – Saturday, July 22, 2017. The Archives is thrilled to be hosting Jen Baldwin as our featured speaker. Stay tuned in the coming weeks for more details, including registration information and the program schedule.
