Using the Zhang Legacy Collection at WMU

The Zhang Legacy Collection at Western Michigan University has resources at the university, local and regional history level. Its holdings include newspapers, manuscripts, diaries, letters, local business records, tax rolls, court records, township minutes, WMU records, and more. The collection is the repository of records for 12 southwest Michigan counties.

Dr. Sharon Carlson, Zhang Legacy Center Archives and Regional History Collections Director, will be our guest speaker on Tuesday, March 24th at 7 pm. Dr. Carlson will prepare attendees for future research at the archives, including CCGS' research trip on Saturday, March 28th.

Dr. Carlson has been an archivist for over 20 years. She earned her doctorate of history from WMU and her MLIS from Wayne State University. Dr. Carlson oversaw the move of the archival collection to its current location at 1650 Oakland Dr, Kalamazoo, MI.■



ow many times have you said that you wished **⊥** you had asked your ancestors questions while they were alive? I know, I have. Conducting oral history interviews is one way to see that you and younger generations don't have these regrets.

Oral History is an important part of genealogy. The Oral History Association defines Tradition Interview Character Testimony

Compassion Art it as a field of study and a method of gathering, preserving and interpreting the voices and

memories of people, communities, and participants in past events.

Oral history brings a richness to your family history that no other source can. It tells the stories of a time gone by. It goes beyond the facts on your family tree and leaves behind a legacy for generations to come.

Once a family member dies their history is lost to his/ her family forever. Now is the time to put oral history higher on your genealogy to do list.

To get started with your family oral history you need to identify who in your family to interview. Start with the oldest members of your family. Include grandparents, aunt and uncles, and cousins. Getting different perspectives on the same question is interesting.

Once you know who to interview, contact the person you want to interview. Ask if you can visit to ask a few family history questions. Setting up a time to meet is better than just dropping in on them. Sometimes they are reluctant to be interviewed and you will need to start simply. Have them identify family photographs and let those conversations flow into a question and answer period. Others may be happy to talk to you. Be sensitive to their feelings. You can always ask again, just don't be a pest.

Create a list of questions you would like to have answered, but be flexible. Let the conversation flow freely. You may be surprised where your questions go. stories of your ancestors starting now. ■

You may encounter sensitive topics and emotional responses, be prepared for it and never go where your interviewee doesn't want to go. Check the online resources section on the next page for help with types of questions to ask and how to handle sensitive topics.

If you plan to share your interview it is a good idea to

print off a permission form for the interviewee to sign. Many good ones can be found online for free.

Think about how you want to capture your interview. Having something you can go back to is the best way. Writing is an option, but can you write as fast as a person speaks? Plus, you want to be engaged with your relative not having your face looking down at a notebook. Think about using unobtrusive recording equipment. Many

smart phones are inconspicuous and have audio and video capacity. Don't have a smart phone look into inexpensive audio or video recording devices.

Next, transcribe what you learned. You can transcribe it word for word and go back and summarize it for sharing, if wanted. You may find you want to do a follow up visit to clarify some answers. This could be done with a phone call or another scheduled visit.

You have created the questions, scheduled a visit, asked the questions, and transcribed them. You don't want all that work to go to waste. You need to plan a way to preserve the stories.

Create your own book, blog, scrapbook, etc. to share with other family members. Be sure to give your interviewee a copy. Also, consider donating it to a local library, genealogical or historical society in the area your ancestor lives. If your ancestor was a veteran, see the next page, "Preserving Veterans' Voices" article.

Preserving Veterans' Voices

of the 16.1 million United States World War II veterans less than 1 million were living in 2017, according to the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs. Most of those are in their 90's. Many community organizations have taken on the task of recording these historically important stories.

Grand Valley State University, Allendale, Michigan has partnered with the Library of Congress to collect veterans' stories since 2006. The Veterans History Project is a digital collection of interviews with people who served during war time, whether they saw combat or not. Veteran stories from WWII, Korean, Iraq and Afghanistan wars are included. Stories of civilians working in the war industry, aid workers, peace activists and civilian contractors are available at GVSU.
