#### MISSION STATEMENT

The Ionia County Genealogical Society is a non-profit volunteer group whose mission is to create awareness and preserve family histories within the Ionia County area. The focus of this group will be to develop genealogical resources and to assist all those seeking local history.

The Ionia County Genealogical Society meeting was attended by 31 people on May 10, 1997. The guest speaker was Stephen Lambers, retired Archivist of Calvin College University Heckman Library, which is located at Heritage Hall just off the East Beltline, in Grand Rapids, Michigan.

The Heckman Library is home of the historical archives of the Christian Reformed Church. There are 500,000 volumes of books there, all telling of the history of the Dutch and the Christian Reformed Church. Mr. Lambers' area of expertise included researching Dutch ancestors using the resources available at the library.

Some of the valuable tools available to researchers included a collection of publications by Robert P. Swierenga, past President of Kent State University. One entitled, "Dutch Household in U.S. Population Censuses, 1850, 1860, 1870", lists all of the heads of households of Dutch descent in the United States during the indicated years. Mr. Swierenga also published a book which gives the passenger lists of Dutch immigrants.

In addition, there are many books written in the Dutch language which tell the history of the many villages of the Netherlands. Although the library itself does not have staff available to translate these documents, they are able to assist in locating others who are willing to translate them. The Ionia County Genealogical Society also has a list of people willing to do translations.

Another resource available at the Heckman Library Archives is 600-700 genealogies all indexed. There is a collection of over 7,000 letters written from the Netherlands which includes 1,600 names of families who are searching for their relatives re in the United States. He stated "Unfortunately, Dutch-Americans did not treasure their letters from the Netherlands in

A valuable source of genealogical data is found in the Banner and DeWachter Obituary Files and Wedding Anniversary Files. This information was found in the weekly publication for the Christian Reformed Church. Some of the obituaries and wedding files are in the Dutch language. They include the names and dates and locations of people who were celebrating wedding anniversaries or those who had died both in the United States and in the Netherlands.

### HE SEARIGHT KOUTZ HISTORY by Cindy Bryant

Searight Koutz was the youngest of the ten children of John Jacob and Sarah, (both buried in North Plains Cemetery). He was born March 6, 1838 in Pennsylvania according to his service records. So that would seem to indicate that the Koutz family did not move into Ohio until after his birth. He moved to Odessa Township, Ionia County, Michigan in the 1850's with his parents and was married near Muir, Michigan in 1860. He was a Civil War veteran; enlisting at Lyons, Ionia Co., MI on August 30, 1862 and served with the Michigan Cavalry, Company E, 6th regiment. He was at the battle of Gettysberg. Searight gained rank and was mustered out November 24, 1865 as Quarter Master Sergeant. Those dates are from a 1943 letter from the US Government. He served under the then young General Custer.

Searight moved to Hecia, Brown County, South Dakota when the Sioux reservation was opened for settlement. This was in the early 1880's. The winter of 1886, Searight came back to Michigan and spent the winter. He signed Sylvia Mabie's autograph book and also his visit was recorded in a local newspaper.

Around 1898 or 1899, when the Sisseton Reservation was opened for settlement, Searight and family moved to Roberts County, SD, near Sisseton, where they homesteaded. The families stayed at the old Fort Sisseton, and lived in the abandoned fort buildings while the men put up buildings on their land.

At one point, Searight owned a feed store and livery stable in Claremont, SD with his son-in-law, Jerome Galusha. About 1918 Searight moved to Alvin, Texas. Searight died at his son Charles' home in Minnesota in 1923, but is buried in Texas. Searight's wife, Nancy R. Evans, was the daughter of Henry Evans, who is buried N. Plains Cemetery, Ionia County. One child of Searight, Noah (1978-9), is buried in Lakeside Cemetery, \_ake Odessa, MI, ages nearly 4 month. The stone is toppled, cracked and mostly under sod.

Searight had two older brothers also in the civil war. Edmund Koutz and Isreal Koutz are both buried in N. Plains Cemetery. Edmund came home sick with dysentery and died and within 3 weeks, 4 of his 5 children also died, leaving his widow and one son.

#### **IONIA GENWEB PROJECT NEWS**

from Beth Wills, Coordinator for Ionia/Montcalm Counties

This is part one in a series of articles about the Ionia GenWeb Project. Those individuals that have access to a computer that is "hooked up to the Internet" have a wealth of genealogical information at their fingertips.

The History of the GenWeb Project - In March and April 1996, a group of genealogists organized the Michigan omprehensive Genealogy Database. The idea was to provide a single entry point for all counties in Michigan, where collected databases would be stored. In addition, the databases would be indexed and cross-linked, so that even if an individual were found in more than one county, they could be located in the index. At the same time, volunteers were found who were willing to coordinate the collection of databases and oversee the contents of the web page.

>What A Coordinator Does - The job of the county coordinators is to write the web pages, accept and organize queries and to assist in the "on-line" organization of the genealogical data found in the county. County coordinators do not actually do research. At this time, there are county coordinators from almost 96% of all of the counties in the United States. From any one county page, you can find any other county page, plus the project pages for many other countries outside of the United States.

....What you can find on the Ionia GenWeb page.

>Vital Records - Records available in Ionia County and in the State of Michigan and where to write for them.

>Churches - These links tell about the early churches in Ionia and the first members of those churches.

>Libraries - Information about the local libraries as well as those major libraries with genealogy collections. There are numerous rolls of microfilm on area happenings as well as a number of family histories on file.

>Cemeteries - There are more than 50 cemeteries in Ionia County. This link will take you to a listing of those cemeteries. Some of the burial records are already in the archives for your "on-line" viewing! This is an on-going project. Almost half of the cemeteries in Ionia have been transcribed and placed in the archives. Most of the cemetery records in Ionia were made in the early 1970's and they need to be updated.

>Newspapers - See what was being published in the early days of Ionia and who was publishing the news. You will also find links to their microfilm holdings and a neat project called The Obituary Daily Times that is in the process of indexing

obits from all over the world. You can be a part of this project."

>Census Records -lonia's census records are available on microfilm at the Hall-Fowler Library in Ionia. The 1850 Ionia County Mortality Index has been transcribed and placed in the archives for your "on-line" viewing. The county census records have not been indexed - but plans are underway to get them indexed and placed in the archives. The archives have a new project in the works, the US GenWeb Census Project. The goal is to have on-line, in the archive, all the census' for 1780 to 1920 for the entire US. Check out the progress and if you have any census data please let me know.

Farly Ionia History - Read about the early settlement of the city of Ionia and pioneers that first came there.

-Early Ionia Businesses - Find out about some of Ionia's early businesses and their proprietors.

>Historical Societies and Historians - Names and addresses of the local societies with links to those "on the web".

>lonia County Communities - Read about the early settlements and the pioneers that settled the area.

>Biographies - A large number of Ionia's early settlers have biographies already transcribed and placed in the archives for your "on-line" viewing. This link will take you to the index of biographies for Ionia County. This is a huge project that has been largely due to two fantastic county volunteers. Cindy Bryant and Cheryl VanWormer have been typing fast and furiously to make those bios available to searchers world-wide. If you have a biography that you would like to have placed in the Ionia archives - we would LOVE to have it.

>lonia County Lookups - find out about the available county resources and those people willing to do look-ups in that resource. I could really use some help here - if you own a county resource and would be willing to look-up facts for researchers, please let me know.

>lonia County Surname Index - This page lists the names submitted by those researching Ionia County. See if anyone is searching the same lines as you and take a few minutes to submit the names you are searching.

>lonia County Queries - Submit your query and read the queries posted by others.

>lonia County Archives - A listing of the records that have been placed in the archives. A number of cemetery transcriptions, indexes, family diaries and bibles, etc. have already been placed in the archives. This project will be "under construction" for a long, long time. If you would like to help with the transcription of records to be placed in the archives, please let me know.

. >Map of Ionia County and Surrounding Areas - a map of Ionia and the surrounding area.

>lonia Area Obituaries - a number of obituaries for Ionia county residents are here - if you have an obituary for an Ionia County resident, I would be happy to post it here.
