GLEANINGS FROM THE BELDING BANNER

Thank you to Rosemary Roundtree for these transcriptions:

July 25, 1895

E.T. Bolster is suffering greatly with stomach trouble.

August 29, 1895 Orleans-Otisco

E.T. Bolster, of Chadwick, spent Saturday in town.

February 20, 1896-Chadwick

E.T. Bolster and E.D. Hammond were in Greenville, Friday.

May 7, 1896-Chadwick

Mrs. Harris Bolster of Easton is spending the week with her parents, Mrs. And Mrs. Leander Berry.

<u>July 17, 1902 – Orleans</u>

Al Bolster is nicely settled in his new meat shop

<u>July 24, 1901 – Orleans</u>

Mrs. E.T. Bolster, of Orleans, struck and thrown – 40 or 50 feet. A most shocking accident occurred at Orleans station a few miles southeast of this city last Thursday evening by which Mrs. E.T. Bolster lost her life. Her home is near the railroad track and is supposed she was looking for her grandson, and for some reason did not hear the approaching eastbound Pere Marquette passenger train. She was struck and thrown a distance of 40 or 50 feet, a leg and and arm being broken and internal injuries sustained.

She only lived about an hour and remained in a semi-conscious state, inquiring if the boy was hurt and if the train struck her, not seeming to fully understand what the trouble was. Further particulars are given by our Orleans correspondent on another page.

We are called to note the sad accident that befell our much respected friend and neighbor, Mrs. E.T. Bolster, while crossing the Pere Marquette railroad in search of her grandson, on Thursday evening about six o'clock, when she was almost instantly killed by the coming engines. The funeral services were conducted by Rec. Dr. Ogden, of Lyons, Saturday at 2 o'clock at M.E.

church; burial at Green's cemetery. The comforting words to the bereaved husband, son and family, were taken from St. John, six chapter, 27 verse. The many beautiful floral tributes and other acts of kindness were appreciated very much by the family. Miss Addie Lucinda Yates was born in Wheatfield, Calhoun County, October 27, 1849, and was married to E.T. Bolster, March 6, 1869, and died July 17, 1902.

January 8, 1903 - Orleans

In despondent mood...Orleans farmer made attempt on his life. Martin Bement tried it in Bolster's market with a meat knife – while there for lunch. Orleans village was thrown into a flurry of excitement Saturday forenoon by the report that Martin Bement a farmer living a mile east of the place had cut his throat in Mr. Bolster's market.

The circumstances as we have been able to gather them are as follows: Mr. Bement, wife and little son had come into town to take the train for Detroit. They rode in with one of their neighbors, Mr. Ferguson. Mrs. Bement suggested that they had better get a lunch to eat on the train while on their way and said she would step into Mr. Bolster's place to get it. But her husband told her he would do so. After entering the building he called for some fried cakes and other lunch. While Mr. Bolsters back was turned Mr. Bement took up a large butcher knife from the meat block and quickly drew it across his throat, before he could make another attempt Mr. Bolster grappled with the desperate man and with the assistance of Mr. Furguson he was taken outside bleeding profusely from the terrible he made. Dr. Wilkinson was called and found a deep cut in the throat but the jugular vein was not severed. He was promptly cared for and it is though he will recover.

The unfortunate man was undoubtly in a

despondent mood brought on by unfavorable financial conditions in his business affairs. His wife said he and acted strangely for some time and only a night or two before he had sharpened his razor, knife and a corn cutter and she had been obliged to watch him – fearing he might do himself harm. He was able to be taken to a hospital in Detroit the following day and [end of article].

October 11, 1906 - Orleans

Mrs. Harris Bolster and children of Cadillac are with her people Mr. and Mrs. Leander Berry. Mr. Bolster will arrive this week with their household goods as they are planning to reside in Belding.

ERROR CORRECTION

frail woman could do so much. She is now upwards of eighty, and is remarkably well preserved. She has not drank a cup of tea or coffee in 55 years. How much the world owes to such noble men and women will never be known to man.

What the buyer terms the best pair of steers marketed in Ionia for years, were yesterday sold by Colonel **THOMAS**, of Odessa to Chester **ADGATE**. They were Durham grade, four years old, and weigh 3,800 pounds.

The Ionia Furniture company, the Michigan Clothing company, and the HAMMELL'S Cigar Company, will shut down to-night until Monday. The Ionia Pant and Overall company will run with part of force on Saturday. The car shops shut down only one day.


Lucille Davenport



This photo was part of a collection of photos from my in-laws home. Lucille is not related to us, as far as I know, so I surmise that she was a neighbor or school friend of Harold Swiler. Some family members believe that she was an ex-girlfriend of his. I wanted to find out more about Lucille, so I starting doing some research on her.

The first thing I learned is the photo was taken in Portland, Ionia County, Michigan. The photographer was Rayona Studio. That is about it!

In searching the census records, I find Lucille living with her parents, Perry and Tacy, and her siblings, Verdan P., Sheldon, Shirley, Harold and Jean in the 1930 census in Lebanon Twp., Clinton County. Lucille is 13 years old and is Michigan born, as is her father. Her mother is born in Kansas.



Later I learned that Lucille married Percy Abendshein of Homer. I located a newspaper article that announced her wedding. This too was part of the Harold Swiler scrapbook.

In checking the death index for the Social Security Administration, I find Lucille M. Abendshein of Homer, Calhoun County, Michigan has died on November 1, 1998. Her birth is listed as January 27, 1917. This was confirmed when I located her birthday listed in a birthday book which was a gift from Harold Swiler's parents to his wife, Marjorie (Aves) Swiler date July 9, 1950. The names and dates were written by Harold's mother's hand, Ruth Swiler.

Her husband, Percy, is listed in a 2002 directory, still living in Homer, Calhoun County, Michigan. Hmmm... wonder if he still lives there? I will let you know!

Aug. 12, 2005 (To: McCord Family Association)

This is just an FYI. Since the McCord family Association is interested in anything McCord, I thought I'd send this on to you. My grandmother, Mildred Colwell Moore, told me that her grandfather's brother was John McCord and he owned a farm, along with his wife "Mima" [Jemima] in Cascade Twp, Kent, MI. At some point, the railroad was coming through and he "donated" (unwillingly) the land needed for the track and station. The track cut right through his farm. McCords, as it is called now, is a sleepy little woodsy neighborhood, in the country. There is a road called McCord that runs through it. The station no longer stands, but the house may still. I've never pursued locating it. (1916 Index to the Kent County Plat Map, M. MC CORD, JNO. H., Section 36, Township CASCADE).

This story is well known in the McCord family, in Ionia County, MI. I ran across the writings of the late *Irene "Renie"* (Speckin) Taylor, descended from Gilbert McCord and his second wife, Jane or Betsey Jane Munger, through their daughter, Clara & husband, George Montgomery. She did a lot of research on our McCords. Here is what she wrote: Pg. 4, (titled) 1981 update:

"I have mentioned before about a small town named McCords, in Kent Co. In the Michigan Place names there is a short story about this town, but nothing as to how it got the name. It is in Cascade Twp. and was once on an old stage line, between Ada and Hastings. In 1888, the Detroit, Lansing and Northern Railroad came through. It was given a Post Office in October 1888 until October 1947. In April of this year we drove to Kent Co. and found a township map and located the town of

McCords. There are a few houses and an old mill, the depot and post office are gone. According to my old plat map, John McCords farm was in this section. We found an old cemetery in Whitneyville and looked around, to my surprise I found the graves of Roy Munger and his wife Cornelia, he was Merritt's son, Martha Rowley's brother. Right across the road was a Methodist church, I went to the minister's house and a woman there told me her father-in-law was 87 years old and he might know something about the family, she gave me his address and went to see him.

He was very nice and said he had heard of John McCord over the years. McCord had donated land from his farm to the R.R. for the train station and John's home used to sit where the depot used to be. John McCord then bought another farm and from his direction, we found the house. He said when the Post Office was established, this is how the town got it's name. Later John McCord sold his farm and moved to Ionia. According to Martha, Nellie McCord was later made his guardian, John died at the County Farm in 1929, he is buried in Easton. The man I talked to was James Bailard. I wrote to the Post Office Archives in Washington for more information about McCords and I received several papers. Two are site maps, showing the exact location, one is a description of the site signed by the first postmaster, Charles Freyermuth, 1888 and one signed by the postmaster, Rolland Colby. A nice peice of family history and I'm glad I pursued it. There is also a McCords Highway and a McCords Creek. In reading over the Civil War record for David McCord [John's brother] I came across an affadavit signed by John McCord, to my surprise the Notary was a William Lind, this is one of the men my

mother has mentioned to many times, she always wondered who he was. In checking the Cascade Twp. map, I found him living right across the road from John McCord."

According to my grandmother, John and Jemima (Kline) McCord had no children. He took in one of his brother's motherless daughters, Nettie McCord, for a number of years, "because she looked so much like her Uncle John" (according to Mildred). Nettie was the daughter of Joseph & Mary (Norris) McCord. Nettie McCord eventually married Clarence Renwick, raised a family in Saranac, Ionia, MI.

John (and Joseph) was the son of Gilbert McCord and Emeline Bridges. He has been the most difficult to research of the brothers, because so many records give conflicting ages, and places of birth.

His 1st marriage lists his age as 23 in 1869, born in Ohio [approx. birth year 1846]. His 2nd marriage, at McCords, MI, lists his age as 52 in 1902, born in W. Virginia [approx birthyear 1850] (wife Fannie Duffey, no children). 1850 census lists him age 5, b. Ohio. The 1860 census lists his age as 17, born in Ohio [approx birthyear 1843] His obituary in 1929, lists his age as 88, a native of Virginia.

Death record lists his age as 88 yrs, 2 mo, 10 days, in 1929, born in N.Y. on Nov 16 1840. Informant's name appears to be Chas. Gates on Ionia. (not a relative to my knowledge, possibly works at the Home) wife: Jeramima McCord. He died of "L-H_Cerebral Hemorage." Buried at Easton Cemetery, undertaker: Allen E. Stett___[Stethens/ Stether?]. He died at the Ionia County Home (for poor & elderly). I use the date 16 Nov 1846 as his most likely birthdate.

1870 Burr Oak, St. Joseph, MI, lists John McCord, age 25 b. Ireland, wife Jemima. (1870 in Easton, Ionia, MI, where his father and siblings are, he is listed as 19, b. PA, living with the Jospeh Norris family. I believe that this was actually his brother Joseph McCord, who would have been about that age and who two years later, marries Joseph Norris daughter, Mary.) shows John McCord age 34, b. with his wife Jemima. Virginia, Michigan. 1900 Calhoun, Pennfield. Cascade, Kent, MI, John McCord b. Nov 1850, age 49, b. OH, parents b. NY, married 20 yrs. (but no wife living with him.)

I recently received an obituary, which adds more information to the mystery of Marion Bidwell. Part of the obit is cut off, as it came out of an old scrapbook.

"PENSIONER 1812 WAR

Mrs. Louisa Warner died in Danby Sunday. Her Husband, Nathaniel Warner, Fought in War of 1812.

Mrs. Louisa Warner, who drew from the government a pension as a widow of a soldier of the war of 1812, died at her home in South Danby, Sunday, aged ?2 years. Funeral services will be held at the house Wednesday. She was the widow of Nathaniel Warner and the two were early settlers in Danby.

Deceased leaves the following children by a former husband, Washington Bidwell:

Adelia Richey, Hannah Tubbs, Jasper Bidwell, Alpheus Bidwell, Danby; Sarah Ingall, Ludington; Marion Bidwell. Greenville. Mrs. ?illie Towner, of Danby. and James Warner of Eagle, are children by the second husband."-end

Bert Roy Bennett

Bert Roy Bennett was born in Orleans Twp., Ionia County, the son of Roy Bennett and Pearl Marie McCain. He married Dorothy Jane Kenny who is also a First Families Society member.

Bert's father, Roy Bennett was born on January 30, 1890 in McBride, Montcalm Co., Michigan. He married Pearl Marie McCain on October 23, 1923, in Greenville, Montcalm Co., Michigan. He died on October 30, 1988 in Ionia Co., Michigan at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Eugene Courser of Clarksville following a lengthy illness. He was laid to rest in the Orleans cemetery.

Roy came to Orleans at the age of three weeks to the farm where he spent his entire life. He was a member of the Maccabee lodge and the Farmer's Grange.

Roy and Pearl had three sons, Bob, Bert and Fred, and three daughters, Clarabelle, Florence and Charlene.

Roy is the son of Frederick Eliza Bennett and Clara Jane Perry. Frederick was born July 31, 1867 in Orleans, Ionia County, Michigan and he died there on November 9, 1947. He and Clara were married on March 6, 1889 at Orangeport, New York. Both are listed on the 1870 and 1880 Federal census for Ionia County, Michigan. Clara Jane Perry was born in New York. They had two children, Roy and Hazel. Clara died in her home at 3:00 a.m. after an illness of just a few days. She was 69 years old. Burial was in the Orleans cemetery.

John Dennis Bennett is the father of Frederick and he is listed as residing in Ionia County in the 1870 and 1880 Federal Census. He was born in 1820 in Otsego Co., New York and died July 1, 1901 of heart failure in Orleans, Ionia County, Michigan. He and his wife, Caroline E. Skutt had five children: Martha M., Alonzo, Minnie, Frederick and Burt B.

Bert Roy Bennett and his wife, Dorothy "Dort" continue to live in Orleans, Ionia County, Michigan. Bert retired from coowning a service station with Dick White on Lincoln Ave and M-66. He enjoys gardening, deer hunting, & fishing. He is said to "keep his lawn & flowers like a county park." They have a cottage at Central Lake, Antrim Co., MI.
