QUARTERMASTER REPRESENTATIVES SPEND DAY IN INSTRUCTION CONFERENCE

A conference for instructing inspectors and contractors on a new inspection and acceptance of squad tents by the Chicago Quartermaster Inspection zone was held on March 30th at Ypsilanti Reed.

Capt. Louis H. Warlick, Jr., QMC, Robert Foreman, and J. V. Coyner of the Chicago Quartermaster Depot were in charge of the conference. Accompanying them were contract representatives from various manufacturing companies, and ten Quartermaster inspectors. Ypsilanti Reed methods of planning, engineering, production, inspection and shipping were reviewed and studied.

In order to speed production of squad tents all over the country, blue prints and operation sheets were given to several of the representatives present. Although production is showing a steady increase it is far below the government's request for these vitally needed squad tents.

MEETING QUOTA IN 7th WAR LOAN

Ypsi Reeders Are Doing It Again! The SEVENTH WAR LOAN Drive Is Going Over With A Bang



Our quota for the three months period which comprises the drive is a total of \$75,000 in bonds. This loan is being handled differently, in that the regular payroll deduction will not be suspended. The drive opened on April 8th and will end June 24th. During the first three days, the cash purchases of bonds amounted to about five thousand dollars' worth of bonds, maturity value.

The Bond Committee feels assured that not only will the quota be met, but that it will exceed all former records. They are anticipating the spirit with which former bond drives were finished, with a race toward the end to see what department would exceed its quota by the greatest percentage.



HOLD CHEST CLINIC

On March 9th and 10th, 226 Ypsi Reeders took advantage of the facilities here to X-ray positive reaction to the T. B. Patch Test. The clinic was under the supervision of the Michigan Tuberculosis Association and the X-rays were taken by Mr. Arnold J. Linden, X-ray Technician from Lansing. Mrs. Maren Brock, plant nurse, Mrs. Tower of M.T.A., Mrs. Mae Randall and Alice Walker assisted in the clinic.

Motion pictures were taken by Mr. Hughes, also of M.T.A. and will be included in a composite picture of their various visits to plants throughout the state. In about a year the film will be completed and will probably be shown here a short while after that time.

YPSI PARTICIPATES IN CLOTHING DRIVE



Ypsilanti Reed employees again met the challenge when they ransacked their clothes closets for clothing to give in the nation's drive to aid the Allied liberated countries. Former Mayor Clarence Johnson appointed Rev. Adam Westmaas as chairman for the city of Ionia, and the goal is 17 tons, or an avrage of about 5 lbs. for every person in Ionia including children.

The accompanying photograph shows Rev. Adam Westmaas, Moon Franch, Mr. Wm. Winchell. and Lawrence Friend from the city committee and Ypsi Reed. The shipping departments from both Ypsilanti Reed and A. C. Spark Plug have volunteered to sort and box all contributions. Rev. Westmaas stated that he was especially appreciative of the help in packing because experienced help is so important in getting the clothing to the National Central boxed depot in good condition. The contributions will be boxed 100 lbs. per carton, with only one type to the box of the various kinds of clothing, both heavy and light articles for infants, children, girls and women, men and boys, serviceable shoes, and bedding.




